

ACCEPTING THAT WE WENT THE WRONG PATH IMPLIES :

- That going the wrong path is felt as a shame, whereas it is only part of life
 - That we probably trusted misleaders and manipulators
- That our judgment and our discernment were personally and collectively altered
- That badly intentioned beings were successful in grouping individuals around illusionary topics
 - That badly intentioned beings were successful in promoting illusionary topics
 - That we were duped essentially by following and by fear of the opinion of others
 - That it gets us close to all beings or people which committed historical mistakes
- That we are not worth better than people who committed historical mistakes, despite technology
- That following with eyes closed is dangerous and knowing historical precedents does not prevent anything if we do not observe with an objective look
 - That we were duped whereas we thought ourselves as superior, which made us blind
- That evolution or sense of history are possibly lure and that only real circumstances count, ego makes mistakes which humility helps to repair
 - That watching the past mistakes as the only threat will make present challenges ignored
 - That if we were trusting oneself more, catastrophe could have had lesser impact
 - That anonymity of self path can be more useful than the recognition of others
 - That following one's path is certainly less dangerous than follow the herd
- That following one's path is not egotistical at all and that one can help others in need along the way
- That following the collective path is certainly more egotistical due to the competition to appear the nicest and the best, probably removing the attention one can have to others in need
 - That we have to forgive ourselves for the wrong choice we made
